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Fall is upon us and as the weather cools and leaves change color, farmers are beginning harvest. In Ohio we mostly think of corn and soybeans when we think of the fall harvest, but other crops, such as apples, pumpkins and

gourds, are ripening as well. Our member companies are prepped and ready to aid farmers with this year's harvest. It sounds like it could be a big one!

USDA's September 10th U.S. crop production report surprised many with their latest estimates. They now predict this corn crop to total 14.184 billion bushels at an average yield of 169.9 bushels per acre. If realized, this would be the third-largest crop ever recorded. Soybeans were also increased. They are now estimated to be at 4.43 billion bushels on an average yield of 49.9 bushels per acre. Keep in mind these numbers do not include

The Ohio Agribusiness Association Student Credential has become an industry-recognized credential through the Ohio Department of Education.

Now known as the Ohio AgriBusiness Association - Agribusiness and Production Systems Certification, the program provides an industry-recognized, agribusiness credential that verifies high school student expertise in the areas of agriculture, agribusiness and production systems.

"Recognition by the Department of Education allows our credential to have greater reach and impact on students across Ohio."

Since the program's implementation in 2016, 13 students have met the program standards to receive the credential. As these students enter the workforce, OABA encourages its members to seek candidates who have acquired the credential.

To be eligible for the program, a student must be enrolled in a career-technical agricultural program

and complete three agricultural courses to engage in learning and apply technical skills in foundational agricultural concepts.
